
The website will also post much of the content of THE LOUISIANA MUSICIAN shortly before or after the magazine publication dates. The website will provide timely updates to published information throughout the year.

and read it from so many sources recently. But the originator is not as important as the message.

Change happens. Deal with it. Because the world around you is constantly changing, your getting better involves you changing. (<u>Disclaimer</u>: Changing does not guarantee improvement unless you change in the right way.)

You cannot stop change. But you do control how well you deal with change. It's a mental thing. Your attitude is something you can control even if you can't control the world evolving around you every day.

In my professional world, change is constant, rapid, layered and often chaotic. On any given day, my bosses (yes, I have multiple bosses) want me to embrace ideas and processes that are new, different, undefined and often untested.

I never have to sit around and wait for a "change-challenge" to come knocking at my door. It's ever-present...screaming at me from my email, in my voice mail, or laying on my desk in multi-colored folders with "urgent" post-it stickers attached.

If nothing else, I've learned that resisting the "change-challenge" is a waste of my time and emotional energy. I am happier and more productive if I simply put my time and effort into finding ways to make change work to my advantage.

I do not believe that all change is good. When change is created only for the purpose of change, bad things often occur. My least favorite cliché is that "Insanity is doing the same thing and expecting different results."

I am a firm believer that there are situations in which the best results are achieved in being very consistent. Doing the same (right) thing over and over and over can be the best solution to certain problems.

On the flip side, I understand the world is constantly evolving and people evolve with it. Maybe it's just me, but it seems the older we get the more we want to stop evolving. We want to rely on what has always worked in the past. The younger you are, the less "past" you have to deal with.

The more successful we become, the more likely we resist the idea of changing what we do and how we do it. Sort of like the "good to great" theory: The enemy of "great" is "good".

If we are good, we tend to be happy and satisfied. Only a small percentage of people who are "good" at what they do ever become "great". You only "move" from good to great if you "evolve" from good to great. That requires that you change as rapidly as the environment around you changes.

Here are my "Seven Hot Ideas" in dealing with change:

- (1) Be a good listener. Don't switch off your brain when a new idea enters the room.
- (2) Keep an open mind. Closing doors in your mind will close the door to opportunity.
- (3) Don't be afraid to change a change. Use your experience and expertise to make a change develop and shift towards the direction of greater productivity.
- (4) Surround yourself with positive, creative and innovative people. Take advantage of their enthusiasm and freshideas.
- (5) Don't blame your boss for a change that came from higher up...make your boss look good by making the change work to everyone's advantage.
- (6) Go with it...especially when you have reservations. Then make it go for you.
- (7) Do not be afraid to address the problems that a change may create. This can be done without rejecting the change. It can make the change better while making you look better.

Well, it's just about time for this year's LMEA Conference. Our All-State Orchestra conductor for this year is Professor Tonu

Kalam. Tonu Kalam, born of Estonian parents, was trained as a conductor, pianist and composer at Harvard University, the University of California at Berkeley, and the Curtis Institute of Music. His summer credits include fellowships at Tanglewood and Aspen as well as many years at the Marlboro Music Festival. A prizewinner in the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra Young Conductor's Competition, he has appeared as guest conductor with the North Carolina Symphony, the Madison Symphony Orchestra, the Huntsville Symphony Orchestra, the Shreveport Symphony Orchestra, the ProMusica Chamber Orchestra of Columbus, the Baton Rouge Symphony Orchestra, the Marlboro Festival Orchestra, and in Europe with the Estonian National Symphony Orchestra and Finland's Oulu Symphony Orchestra.

Mr. Kalam has conducted over 135 opera performances for companies including the Shreveport Opera, the Lake George Opera Festival, and the Nevada Opera. As an educator, he has guest conducted all-state, all-region and all-county orchestras in New York, North Carolina, Texas and Montana. He has been a faculty member at the University of Illinois and has held visiting appointments at the University of Miami in Florida and St. Olaf College in Minnesota. For 13 years Mr. Kalam was an administrator and artist-faculty member at the renowned Kneisel Hall summer chamber music festival in Blue Hill, Maine.

Presently he is a Professor of Music at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, serving as Music Director and Conductor of the UNC Symphony Orchestra. Since 1988 Mr. Kalam has concurrently held the position of Music Director and Conductor of the Longview Symphony Orchestra in Texas. In addition to his conducting activities, he performs regularly as a pianist and chamber musician and he is also a member of the Advisory Council and former president of the Conductors Guild, an international organization devoted to serving the artistic and professional needs of conductors.

Maestro Kalam has selected the following program for the Orchestra:

Berlioz: Hungarian March from "The Damnation of Faust"

Fauré: Pavane

Vaughan Williams: Serenade to Music

Rimsky-Korsakov: Russian Easter Overture

In addition to a wonderful repertoire, Professor Kalam will present a clinic on Saturday morning for us. His clinic is titled, "The Conductor Preparation." This promises to be very informative; and I hope to see you there.

Our other string clinic will be presented by Dr. Michael Buckles. Dr. Buckles is Associate Professor of Upper Strings and Music Education at McNeese State University. Previous positions include Dillard University, Xavier University, and the preparatory division at the University of New Orleans. Performance credits include a tenured position with the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra, principal second of the Rapides Symphony, and his current appointment as concertmaster of the Lake Charles Symphony.

As an educator, Dr. Buckles has successfully developed string programs in the New Orleans and Lake Charles areas. As director of the Lake

Charles area youth orchestra, he successfully brought the group to the Louisiana Music Educators' Association state large ensemble festival for the first time in the orchestra's history. Since that time, the organization has doubled in size and has been awarded the City of Lake Charles' Mayor's Award for Cultural Group of the Year.

Dr. Buckles Session title is: "Fostering String Playing and Instruction" - The National String Project Consortium at McNeese State University

The National String Project Consortium was created to encourage children to learn a string instrument while addressing a documented lack of string education specialists in the United States. Housed at colleges and universities throughout the nation, these "String Project Sites" are largely managed by college students, who are responsible for the recruitment and teaching of group classes while being supervised and mentored by a public school string specialist. The prescribed structure for String Project Sites was developed at the University of South Carolinian and has been written about favorably in the New York Times and the Journal of Research in Music Education. In this session, the history, structure, as well as the application process for inclusion in the Consortium will be discussed.

Other sessions for the ALL-State Orchestra will include string sectionals on Saturday afternoon. I am still seeking string teachers to lead these sectionals. Please let me know if you are interested in assisting our All-State String players prepare for their performance.

Very important! All orchestra directors and private string instructors, please know that in order to insure two well balanced violin sections, the first and second violin parts were assigned as follows based on the ranking of the audition adjudicators:

#1 and #2 - First Violin

#3 and #4 - Second Violin

The remainder of the violin section was assigned as follows; odd numbers to First Violin and even numbers to Second Violin.

I am looking forward to another GREAT All-State Orchestra performance and I hope you will join us in Baton Rouge later this month.

He is also the guest conductor of professional jazz ensembles and radio orchestras in Germany, Italy, Denmark, Sweden, and Norway. He has previously served as Professor of Jazz Studies at the Eastman School of Music. His works have been performed by jazz, orchestral, wind, choral, and chamber ensembles worldwide. His works are also printed by nine international publishers and are issued on four record labels. Fred Sturm will present a jazz clinic titled "ALL EARS: Improvisation, Aural Training, and the Creative Process" on Saturday, November 20, from 9a.m. – 9:50a.m.

There will be two other jazz clinics at LMEA and these aim to be wonderful displays of jazz knowledge and advice as to how to improve your jazz programs. On Saturday, November 20, from 7p.m. – 7:50p.m., there will be a jazz trumpet clinic titled "Trumpet Tips: Improving Style and Techniques in Young Trumpet Sections". This clinic will be presented by Dr. Brian Shaw, Jazz Ensemble Director at L.S.U. On Sunday morning, November 21, from 9:00a.m. – 9:50a.m., Mr. Jay Ecker, band director at Westlake High School, will present a jazz clinic titled "Using Technology to Teach Jazz Improvisation". Both of these jazz clinics will inspire you and give you some much needed information to assist you in your jazz education and in developing your students into better jazz performers.

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"Growing through Giving"_____

"Great teachers never stop learning." This is the statement that began my last article. Normally, I wouldn't use the same opening, but something happened on September 10 that altered my usual thought process.



One of the truly great teachers I have known died on that day. She was a few weeks from her 29th birthday. Nonetheless, in her brief time on our planet, she had inspired many of us with her commitment to music education, children, and the importance of continually learning and growing.

I only knew April Gastal Winner for a few short years. Her passion for music and teaching was her life's work. Her love for her husband, Wayne, her family, and her church was of utmost importance to her. She was young at heart and an old soul at the same time. She had a sense of humor that was irrepressible, and she found joy in everything she did.

When I worked with April in the children's community choir we directed, she was organized, knowledgeable, and an excellent conductor. I saw her teach her students at St. John Elementary School. They loved her and couldn't wait to get to her music class, and she in turn loved them. She was very active in our district vocal music teachers' organization while she taught in Lake Charles.

She completed her bachelor's degree at Northwestern, moved to Lake Charles with her husband, enrolled in the Kodaly certification program at McNeese, began her master's degree, completed her certification, and shortly thereafter finished her post-graduate degree. April served the Louisiana Association of Kodaly Educators as president and would have continued to serve that organization as well as being an active member of Music Educators National Conference and the Louisiana Music Educators Association. In her few years as a music educator, she had taken advantage of all subsequent opportunities presented, attended our state conference several times and at least one national OAKE conference, and would have embraced chances available to her to grow and learn throughout her life had it not been cut short. April Gastal Winner was an inspiration to all music teachers and a living testament to the adage, "great teachers never stop learning." I am so glad that my life intersected with hers because she was a wonderful person, an incredible teacher, and a role model.

Our conference is shaping up, and it will be another superb opportunity to grow and learn no matter whether you are a beginning teacher, an experienced educator, or a teacher with many, many years of working with musicians of all ages. Remember, our time together will begin on Thursday afternoon at 4:00 p.m. with Amanda Page Smith from New York who is our main attraction this fall. She has created a slate of sessions that will help all of us with our pre-school classrooms, our elementary choirs, and our own (and our students') healthy vocal production. Here is a list of her sessions and brief description of each.

Make a Joyful Noise! Pre-school music in the music room and the classroom: Part 1. Learn songs, games and listening activities for your youngest music students, as well as "energy management" strategies to help small children focus and engage during music class. This

session will also include musical activities and ideas to incorporate music into the pre-school general classroom. Participants can attend this "Part 1" session only, or they can attend "Part 1 and 2" as a series.

Make a Joyful Noise! Pre-school music in the music room and the classroom Part 2. Learn MORE songs, games and listening activities for your youngest music students, as well as "energy management" strategies to help small children focus and engage during music class. This session will also include musical activities and ideas to incorporate music into the pre-school general classroom. Participants can attend this "Part 2" session only, or they can supplement it with "Part 1 and 2" as a series.

Repertoire and Strategies for a Beautiful Elementary Choir. This session features a varied repertoire packet of unison and 2-part octavos geared toward the 3rd-5thgrade choir.

Dynamic warm-ups! Learn warm-up exercises that will develop healthy vocal technique for both the elementary choir and its conductor! These exercises will address posture, breath, resonance, tone, range, and ensemble skills.

The Red Stick Chapter of the American Orff Schulwerk Association is sponsoring Dr. Judith W. Cole from Texas A & M -- Kingsville this year. Dr. Cole will present three sessions: Volumes of Possibilities I: Explore the possibilities for developing musicianship through chanting and singing, moving and playing instruments offered by selections from the Orff Schulwerk Music for Children volumes, the primary source material for elemental music. Round and Round We Go: Explore rounds and canons through singing, moving and playing Orff instruments. Learn to create your own rounds and canons. Spanish Songs and Games for Children: Participants will learn songs and singing games of Spanish-speaking children, as well as accompaniment arrangements for Orff instruments.

Also, the Louisiana Association of Kodály Educators is co-sponsoring the appearance of Betty Hillmon who also will present three sessions. She is Department Head of Music at the Park School in Brookline, MA. She holds the BA in Music - San Jose State; a MA in Music Performance (cello), Fresno State; MA in Musicology, Harvard; Kodály Music Education Certificate, Liszt Academy, Budapest, Hungary; and an Advanced Studies Certificate from the Kodály Musical Training Institute, Wellesley, MA. Ms. Hillmon served on the faculty of the Kodály Music Institute and the Kodály Center of America. She has worked directly with Bessie Jones and Frankie and Doug Quimby of the Georgia Sea Island Singers. 

Music Education's Mission

Mission driven activity is essential to makeing a profession more than a job. We behave each day strategically so that society will be improved by such purposeful



activity. Our mission is to improve society, and each individual in it, through music education.

Our professional practice sits squarely within the mission of public education. "The goal of the public educational system is to provide learning environments and experiences, at all stages of human development that are humane, just, and designed to promote excellence in order that every individual may be afforded an equal opportunity to develop his full potential" (La. Const. (1974)8:1). Where does music education fit within this charge? For more than fifty years, the mission of LMEA has been "to elevate the character, to advance the professional interest and otherwise to promote the cause of music education." In the September issue of the *Music Educators Journal*, Scott Schuler, MENC President, restated the mission of MENC – "assuring every child in America a high-quality music education." When we joined LMEA and MENC, in part we agreed that this was our mission, too. Before teaching in a Louisiana public school, educators are required to take an oath upholding the Constitution and the laws of the State of Louisiana.

It is more important today than any time I can remember to operate each day mission driven. We are dealing with diminished resources at every turn in terms of time, money, and support for excellence. We must educate in such a way that the humanity and justice of our profession is evident to our students and to the community of which they are a part. We must provide excellence at every level based upon a thorough understanding of the standards of our profession from a state and national perspective. "Good enough" will cause us to lose focus and welcome our further diminution. This means much more than the Sweepstakes at a Festival or exploiting our "best performers."

Every student should have access to quality arts education experiences. Music education, especially at the middle school and high school levels, is designed to promote excellence. The expressive elements won't mean much if the band, choir, or orchestra performs 90% of the rhythms and pitches correctly. Excellence must be evident in all our students in terms of their knowledge, skills, and habits. Only then can we take our place in the larger picture of education.

The first instrument I learned to play was a clarinet. I began playing in the middle of eighth grade and continued into high school and college. I had the opportunity to tour Europe with great young musicians from fifty states. I played the *third* clarinet part, above me sat the best clarinet players I had yet heard. I enjoyed this performance experience so much that during my senior year in high school, I joined the Glassmen Drum & Bugle Corps. As many of you know, there are no woodwinds in drum and bugle corps. I learned how to play the soprano bugle and trumpet.

Of course, I began playing the third part. While playing there and in college, I proudly told everyone that my mission was to be the best second and third trumpet player I could. The job of the second and third parts was to contribute to creating the most beautiful sound. This meant in addition to playing your part well, you created a foundation of sound that supported the soloists, the leads, and the firsts.

Why is arts education important? Arts education is commonly referred to as an enrichment or an elective. The visual and performing arts are not a nicety; they are a necessity in the 21st century. While media arts are an emerging field in arts education, students will still need to have an experiential understanding of the elements of the arts. In music those are rhythm, melody, harmony, form, and expression. We have known since the 1890's that the habits born from performing the arts are exactly those needed to develop a productive work force. The countries with the highest academic and vocational ratings are those with arts at the center of the schooling experience, not as an after-thought, *e.g.*, Finland.

First, arts communicate that which is not easily put into words or numbers. Arts pedagogy books describe how the arts can be traced back to pre-recorded history. Arts are part of the human experience. All forms of arts production precede the development of literacy. This is a strong reason why all students should study them, if our society is to be ready for the challenges of this century. (Two great books on this topic are *Strong Arts, Strong Schools* by Charles Fowler and *Why Schools Need the Arts* by Jessica H. Davis.) Arts education, minimally, has the following features: a tangible product, a focus on emotion, toleration for ambiguity, a process orientation, and a sense of connection (Davis, 2008). Such summarizes the dispositions required of a successful person at this time.

Quality music education is comprehensive, sequential, and standards-based. Students use the elements to reproduce and create music. Students learn about their likes, dislikes, and how to express them in a respectful way. They develop skills of reflection and move from simple judgments to planning how to improve future performance (both informal and formal). The sense of connection is developed through both engagement and responsibility. "These essential skills have implications for performance in any arena, but are uniquely acquired through arts [education]" (Davis, 2008, p. 74).

In 1780, in a letter to his wife, John Adams wrote, "I must study politics and war that my sons may have liberty to study mathematics and philosophy. My sons ought to study mathematics and philosophy, geography, natural history, naval architecture, navigation, commerce, and agriculture, in order to give their children a right to study painting, poetry, music, architecture, statuary, tapestry, and porcelain." Two hundred-thirty years have passed since President Adams defined a curriculum for the future. When will it be fully realized?

When some students are prevented from studying the arts, the experience is diminished for all. Those students with a limited or no arts education have not had adequate experiences in creating, imagining, expressing, empathizing, interpreting, respecting, and engaging. Our failure to assure the experience of creative excellence in every child damages America's future for the individual and for the society at large. Martin Luther King, Jr. summarized what a quality individual life and quality society would look like. "If a man is called to be a street sweeper, he should sweep streets even as Michelangelo painted, or Beethoven composed music, or Shakespeare wrote poetry. He should sweep streets so well that all the hosts of heaven and earth will pause to say, here lived a great street sweeper who did his job well." Our mission - to see that every child has experienced this excellence so they are prepared to take their place and fully contribute to the social, cultural, and economic aspects of our society. Without excellent arts experience for all the total quality of life in each community is diminished.

LMEA 2010 Hall of Fame Inductee

Marty Hurley

Marty Hurley, a graduate of Neptune High School in New Jersey, received his BME from Wilkes University, Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania, and performed four years with the Air Force Band. For the past 36 years Marty has been the Director of Bands at Brother Martin High School in New Orleans, Louisiana.



As a member of LMEA (Louisiana Music Educators Association) Marty has served as the District VI Senior High Honor Band Chairman and the 2001 - 2003 President of the District VI Band Directors Association.

For the past several years Hurley has conducted percussion clinics for the regional and national meetings of the Music Educators' National Conference (MENC), the Catholic Music Educators' Conference, the Louisiana Music Educators' Association, the Texas Music Educators' Association, and the Percussive Arts Society International Convention. Since 1975, Hurley's bands at Brother Martin High School in New Orleans have been consistent winners of sweepstakes awards at regional concert and marching competitions. During this time at Brother Martin he has had 77 percussion students from his beginning percussion class eventually become All State performers.

He has also acted as percussion instructor at Nicholls State University in Thibodaux, Louisiana, and twice judged the national finals of the Marching Bands of America contest, and the Percussive Arts Society National Marching Forum. At the present time Marty is a Marching Percussion Clinician for Pearl Percussion , Sabian Cymbals and his music and instructional videos are published by Row-Loff Productions.

In November of 2002 Marty performed as a soloist on The Drummer's Heritage Concert at the Percussion Arts Society International Convention in Columbus, Ohio. Two years later in September of 2004 he was inducted into the World Drum Corps Hall of Fame in Scranton, Pennsylvania. A former member of New Jersey's Hawthorne Caballeros and Blessed Sacrament's Golden Knights, Marty served as percussion instructor for the Stardusters (Arabi, Louisiana) 1971, the Bleu Raiders (Metairie, Louisiana) 1972-73, and the Black Knights (Belleville, Illinois) 1973-75. During his tenure as percussion instructor and arranger with the Phantom Regiment (Rockford, Illinois), the corps placed in the top ten nationally for 14 years at D.C.I. finals competition in Denver, Philadelphia, Birmingham, Montreal, Miami, Madison, Kansas City, Buffalo and Dallas.

The induction ceremony, a part of the LMEA Conference program, is scheduled for Saturday, November 20th, at 3:00 p.m., in the Baton Rouge Crowne Plaza Hotel ballroom.

Three distinguished Louisiana jazz educators have been selected for induction to the Louisiana Association of Jazz Educators Hall of Fame in 2010. The award ceremony takes place preceding the LMEA All-State Jazz Ensemble performance at the annual LMEA State Music Conference. The public is invited to attend along with friends and families of the administrator.

James Miller covers the full spectrum of music education but his first love has always been "Jazz". He started teaching in 1954 at St. Anthony School in Baton Rouge while working on his degree in Music Education at L.S.U.

During his college days, Mr. Miller played professionally with many jazz greats namely Carl Fontana and Lee Fortier. He was also

the trombonist and singer along with his wife, AdaBelle, with the popular local jazz vocal group "The Versatones" under the direction of Larry Muhoberac, who went on to great heights in the music industry! He played for the Ringling Brothers Circus and Rodeo Bands throughout the South, lead trombone with the Buddy Lee Band.

Upon his graduation from L.S.U. in 1957, Mr. Miller's first teaching assignment was at Woodlawn High School. In 1968 he went to Sherwood Junior High where he was one of the first innovators of the

Junior High Stage Band now called Jazz Band – many of these students ultimately became Band Educators and performers. To name a few Stephanie Musso, Band Director Central Primary, Jeff Chatelain, lead trumpet player in several bands in New Orleans and Baton Rouge, J.R. Miller, Band Director of St. Joan of Arc, Chuck Bergeron, Professor of Jazz Studies Miami University.

Mr. Miller retired in 1978 to go into the music retail business for a few years. He came out of retirement in 1987 and taught 12 years at Istrouma Middle Magnet and McKinley Middle Magnet.

During his college years and post graduate years, Mr. Miller played with the Baton Rouge Symphony for 41 years. One of his fondest memories is playing in Carnegie Hall in New York.

He has continued to perform and teach and adjudicate in Louisiana and



Mississippi. He is presently employed with Allyson's World of Music Company where he is continually in touch and on top of the jazz music scene in Baton Rouge and New Orleans. Currently he is performing at various churches in the area – The Pelican State Brass Band and the Baton Rouge Jazz Ensemble.


John M. Dilkey began his musical career in Anderson, Indiana as a young student of the piano and organ. He graced his

church with his talents and grew to love the music of the Big Bands. A talented trombonist, John's leadership in the Anderson High School Band delighted crowd; as band captain, his antics and sense of humor are recalled even today. It was during these years that he began arranging and playing as a freelance musician.

John received his Bachelor's Degree from Butler University and his Master's Degree from The Ohio State University. While in the Midwest, Mr. Dilkey taught in the Ohio and Indiana Public School sys-

tems before pursuing a Doctorate at Indiana

University. Moving to New Orleans in 1977, he served as Director of Bands at Tulane University for twenty-one years. He was an adjudicator for the LMEA festivals and was invited to conduct the Louisiana All State Jazz Ensemble. A successful freelance musician, playing trombone, tuba, and piano with numerous professional groups around the city, John performed with the Louisiana Jazz Repertory Orchestra, the Blue Room Big Band, and the Ronnie Kole Orchestra. As a regular in the orchestras of the Saenger Theatre, Le Petit Theatre, the Tulane Summer Lyric, Kolb's Restaurant October Fest Band, the Leif Pederson Big Band, the newly created British Brass Band, the World War II Museum Band, as well as Dixieland and jazz ensembles around New Orleans, Mr. Dilkey performed with the best of the best. One of his most memorable gigs was playing for Ella Fitzgerald. After retiring from Tulane University, Mr. Dilkey

taught in the St. Tammany Parish School System as a Talented Music Teacher, and most recently worked as a Louisiana State Adjudicator for the Talented Music Program.

In addition to the numerous compositions Mr. Dilkey has published for large jazz ensemble, such as The Ruffus Shuffle, Angela, and The Skipper Strut, he has arranged extensively for local high school and college concert bands, jazz bands, and show choirs. His most recent professional endeavor was the arrangement of the 1940's Big Band Musical Show for the opening of the Canteen at the New Orleans World War II Museum as well as an arrangement of Cole Porter's "Primitive Man" for the debut performance of the professional trio ANA, at a Scholarship Series Concert presented by the State University of New York at Fredonia.

Giving back to his community was important to him. He performed regularly at local nursing homes and served as a Board Member of the Slidell Symphony Society. Mr. Dilkey was responsible for organizing 'informances' by professional musicians for the students of St. Tammany Parish, educat-

ing and inspiring the youth in the community. The Slidell Symphony Society has established a living memorial in his name to continue this program.

Willis Delony is the Aloysia Barineau Professor of Keyboard Studies and Professor of Jazz Studies at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge. He is also the Interim Director of the School of Music and Associate Dean of the College of Music and Dramatic Arts. A past recipient of an Artist Fellowship given by the Louisiana Division of the Arts in recognition of his achievements in classical and jazz performance, Delony has earned national and international acclaim as

a pianist, conductor, chamber player, commercial composer, and arranger.



He is featured in collaboration with bassoonist William Ludwig on the recent recording, Rhapsody in Bassoon, on the Mark Records label, which features the world premiere recording of André Previn's Sonata for Bassoon and Piano.

During recent concert seasons, Delony has appeared as piano soloist or conductor with American orchestras in Wichita, Pittsburgh,

(Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra). Spartanburg (South Carolina), Rochester, Omaha, Nashville, Fort Worth, New Orleans (Louisiana Philharmonic), Shreveport, the Sun River Festival Orchestra in Bend. OR and the Florida Orchestra (Tampa). He has appeared as guest soloist with the Columbus (GA) Symphony, Orlando Philharmonic, Toledo Symphony, the Baton Rouge Symphony, the Louisiana Sinfonietta and, in a 2002 Asian tour, the Shanghai Symphony. As a solo recitalist, he performed classical and iazz concerts throughout the United States and Europe. His

Willis Delony recent performance of Prokofiev's Piano Concerto No. 3 with the LSU Symphony helped mark the grand re-opening of the university's redesigned Union Theater.

Tonu Kalam Conductor 2010 Louisiana All-State Orchestra

Tonu Kalam will present a clinic titled "The Conductor's Preparation" on Saturday, November 20, 2010 from 9:00-10:00 a.m.

Tonu Kalam will conduct the Louisiana All-State Orchestra in concert on Sunday, November 21, 2010 from 2:00-2:50 p.m.



Tonu Kalam, born of Estonian parents, was trained as a conductor, pianist and composer at Harvard University, the University of California at Berkeley, and the Curtis Institute of Music. His summer credits include fellowships at Tanglewood and Aspen as well as many years at the Marlboro Music Festival. A prizewinner in the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra Young Conductor's Competition, he has appeared as guest conductor with the North Carolina Symphony, the Madison Symphony Orchestra, the Huntsville Symphony Orchestra, the Shreveport Symphony Orchestra, the ProMusica Chamber Orchestra of Columbus, the Baton Rouge Symphony Orchestra, the Marlboro Festival Orchestra, and in Europe with the Estonian National Symphony Orchestra and Finland's Oulu Symphony Orchestra.

Mr. Kalam has conducted over 135 opera performances for companies including the Shreveport Opera, the Lake George Opera Festival, and the Nevada Opera. As an educator, he has guest conducted all-state, all-region and all-county orchestras in New York, North Carolina, Texas and Montana. He has been a faculty member at the University of Illinois and has held visiting appointments at the University of Miami in Florida and St. Olaf College in Minnesota. For 13 years Mr. Kalam was an administrator and artist-faculty member at the renowned Kneisel Hall summer chamber music festival in Blue Hill, Maine.

Presently he is a Professor of Music at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, serving as Music Director and Conductor of the UNC Symphony Orchestra. Fred Sturm will conduct the Louisiana All-State Jazz Ensemble in concert on Sunday, November 21, 2010 from 3:55 to 4:40 p.m.



Fred Sturm is the Director of Jazz and Improvisational Music at the Lawrence University Conservatory of Music in Appleton, Wisconsin. He serves as guest conductor of professional jazz ensembles and radio orchestras in Germany, Italy, Denmark, Sweden, and Norway; as director of university jazz ensembles and high school all-state jazz

throughout the U.S.; as clinician at national educational conferences and festivals; as composer-in-residence for schools and university music program; as co-owner of Tritone Jazz Fantasy Camps; and as composition/arranging resource team representative for the International Association for Jazz Education.

Fred's compositions and arrangements have been performed by jazz ensembles, symphony orchestras, wind ensembles, and chamber groups worldwide, featuring renowned artists Bobby McFerrin, Wynton Marsalis, Bob Brookmeyer, Clark Terry, Phil Woods, and Broadway Phantom of the Opera Star Davis Gaines. His works are published by Lorenz Heritage JazzWorks, Universal Edition, Sierra Music Publications, Kendor, Warner Brothers/Alfred Music, Advance Music, Ensemble Publications, Really Good Music, and UNC Jazz Press, have been issued on Concord Jazz, RCA, Media, and Warner Brothers and received a 1997 Grammy Award nomination.

Fred was the 2003 recipient of the ASCAP/IAJE Commission in Honor of Quincy Jones, a prize granted annually to one established jazz composer of international prominence. He has received grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, Meet the Composer, the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences, the Howard Hanson Institute for American Music, and the Lila Wallace/Reader's Digest Fund. His texts, Changes Over Time: The Evolution of Jazz Arranging, Kenny Wheeler: Collected Works on ECM, and Maria Schneider: Evanescene are published by Advance Music (Germany) and Universal Edition (Vienna), and his teaching concept titled All Ears: Improvisation, Aural Training, and the Creative Process is used by educators in numerous schools.

Fred served as Professor and Chair of Jazz Studies and Contemporary Media at the Eastman School of Music in New York from 1991 to 2002, where he directed the internationally acclaimed Eastman Jazz Ensemble, conducted the 70-piece Eastman Studio Orchestra, and coordinated the Eastman jazz composition and arranging program. During his university teaching career, Downbeat Magazine has cited his ensembles as the finest in the United States and Canada nine times. He studied at Lawrence, Eastman, and the University of North Texas, and was a founding member of the jazz nonet Matrix. He received the University Award for Excellence in Teaching at Lawrence in 2005.


Dr. Barbara Wesley Baker Conductor

Dr. Barbara Wesley Baker will present a clinic titled "Recruitment and Retention of High School Singers: Finding Creative Ways to Grow Your Choir" on Friday, November 19, 2010 from 3:00-4:00 p.m.

Dr. Barbara Wesley Baker will conduct the Louisiana All-State Choir in concert on Saturday, November 20, 2010 from 3:15-4:00 p.m.

Barbara Wesley Baker, internationally noted conductor and educator, conducted the Chamber, Women's, Men's, Concert and Gospel Choirs at Eleanor Roosevelt High School in Greenbelt, Maryland for 30 years before retiring in 2008.. Her choirs won numerous first place trophies and superior ratings at state, national and international festivals. Her Chamber Choir won first place, best choir, and best soloist at the Chicago, Illinois Heritage Music Festival in March 2007. Dr. Baker conducted a master class on Black Gospel Music for the City of Mondovi, Italy sponsored by the performing group, Cantus Firmus. She also co-guest conducted with Dr. Joseph Flummerfelt, the "Lift Every Voice and Sing, An American Masterpieces Choral Festival" sponsored by the Houston Chamber Choir in Houston, Texas in 2008.



Dr. Baker frequently presents sessions at division and national conventions of the American Choral Directors Association, and the Music Educators National Conference. She was a featured choral music clinician for the Texas Music Educators Association's convention in February, 2009. Dr. Baker conducted master classes at the Toronto International Music Festival and the Choral Music Experience/British Choral Institute, Hertfordshire, England for Dr. Doreen Rao. Dr. Baker also conducted the 2000 ACDA Eastern Division High School Honor Choir, and her Chamber Choir performed with Dave Brubeck at the 2000 MENC National Convention in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Baker taught and conducted secondary school students in Limerick and Dublin, Ireland for the Royal Dublin Society. She taught workshops for CMP at the Hartt School of Music, at McDaniel College (formerly Western Maryland College) and at the Brightleaf Music Workshop at Duke University. From 2001-2003, Dr. Baker comusic directed The Choral Arts Society of Washington's (DC) Annual Dr. Martin Luther King Choral Tribute at the John F. Kennedy Center. For the past 29 years, Dr. Baker has been the director of the Colesville United Methodist Church Gospel Choir, in Silver Spring, Maryland.

Dr. Baker earned her Bachelor of Music Degree from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro; the M.A. degree from Teachers College, Columbia University, NY, NY; and the Ph.D. degree from the University of Maryland.

Dennis Fisher will conduct the Louisiana All-State Symphonic Band in concert on Monday, November 22, 2010 from 3:00-3:50 p.m.



Dennis Fisher is the Conductor of the Symphonic Band, Associate Director of Wind Studies at the University of North Texas, and Professor of Music in Conducting and Ensembles

Fisher has a wide variety of experience and expertise as a conductor, arranger, clinician, educator, and consultant. Mr. Fisher is very active as an arranger for all wind mediums, including symphonic band, marching band and chamber music. Also, he frequently serves as a clinician, conductor, and adjudicator throughout the United States along with international appearances in Thailand, Japan, Great Britain, Europe, Scandinavia, Canada, Greece, and Russia. He recently served as guest conductor of the Southeast Asian Youth Wind Ensemble in Bangkok, Thailand and as Judge for the All Asian Symphonic Band Competition. In addition, Fisher currently serves as principal guest conductor of the Volga Band, Professional Wind Orchestra in Saratov, Russia.

Mr. Fisher has recorded extensively on the Mark, Klavier, and G.I.A. labels with the University of North Texas Symphonic Band and Wind Symphony. He is Co-Author of *Teaching Music Through Performance in Beginning Band, Volume 2*. He also is recording and editing producer of the *Teaching Music through Performance in Band* series compact disc recordings, and editor of the *Master Conductor* DVD series, published and distributed by G.I.A. Publications.

Mr. Fisher holds professional memberships in the Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters Association, the College Band Directors National Association, and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia. He has been honored by being elected to membership in the prestigious American Bandmasters Association and with invited membership in Phi Beta Mu National Band Fraternity. He is a voting member of the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences and is Past-President of the Southwest Division of the College Band Directors National Association.

Mr. Fisher has been awarded the Gagarin Medal of Honor from the Society of Cosmonauts of the Russian Federal Space Agency. Other honors include twice being named "Top Prof" by the Mortarboard Society at U.N.T., and recipient of the University of North Texas Community Award.

Ralph Ford will conduct the Louisiana All-State Concert Band in concert on Monday, November 22, 2010 from 2:05-2:50 p.m.



Ralph Ford (b. 1963) is Director of Bands and Professor of Music at Troy University (AL). A native of Panama City, Florida, he has served on the university faculty in numerous areas of expertise since 1986, working mainly as the assistant director, arranger and theory instructor. Since 2001, Professor Ford has been the conductor of the Troy University Symphony Band and Chamber Winds, as well as the director of the nationally renowned "Sound of the South" Marching Band. His compositions and arrangements for band have been commissioned and performed by middle school, high school, collegiate, and professional bands worldwide. He currently serves as an exclusive composer-arranger for the Belwin division of Alfred Publications, a position he has enjoyed for over a decade. Currently, he has over 175 publications for concert band, orchestra, jazz ensemble, and marching band available worldwide. Professor Ford has served extensively in the United States and Canada as a composer, arranger, conductor, clinician, technology consultant and adjudicator.

Outside of the field of music education, he has composed, recorded, and produced music, jingles, and 3D graphic designs for radio, television, and video productions. He has won numerous "Addies," as well as recognition and awards from various agencies and international associations for his creative work in the media field. His active professional memberships include the American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers (ASCAP), Phi Beta Mu International Bandmasters Fraternity, Music Educators National Conference, the National Band Association, the Troy Rotary Club, Phi Mu Alpha, Kappa Kappa Psi, Tau Beta Sigma, Sigma Alpha Iota and Delta Chi, among others. Professor Ford has received the Outstanding Artist Award from the Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi. He has participated in articles discussing the incorporation of electronic instruments into the modern wind ensemble and was recently a featured composer in an interview for the series Teaching Music through Performance in Band, Vol. 7. In March 2009, he was elected to membership in the prestigious American Bandmasters Association.

He is married to Amanda Ford and they reside in Troy with their daughters, Melanie and Abby.

Ferguson served as Director of Visual and Performing Arts for the Savannah-Chatham County Public Schools for 10 years prior to his retirement on July 1, 2008. Ferguson was a member of the administrative team that founded the Savannah Arts Academy in 1998, a dedicated visual and performing arts public high school. He has served as a public school music educator at every level from elementary school through graduate school and was employed as director of music education and instrumental music at Mercer University in Macon, Georgia, as Music Department Chair at Adams State College in Alamosa, Colorado and as Music Executive at Winthrop University in Rock Hill, South Carolina. Benny Ferguson is past president of the Georgia Music Educators Association and past president of the Georgia chapter of Phi Beta Mu International Bandmasters Fraternity. Brian Shaw is Assistant Professor of Trumpet and Jazz Studies at

Louisiana State University and is Co-Principal Trumpet of the Dallas Wind Symphony.

He maintains an active schedule on modern and baroque trumpet as a freelance player in the classical and jazz idioms, and has written works for solo trumpet, trumpet ensemble, solo voice, wind ensemble, jazz ensemble, and orchestra. As a performer, he placed first in the International Trumpet Guild's 2002 Solo Competition, 2001 Mock Orchestral Competition, the

jazz division of the 1998 National Trumpet Competition, won the Silver Medal in the 2004 Ellsworth Smith International Trumpet Competition and was a semi-finalist in the 2000 Maurice André Competition.

As a Baroque trumpet player, Brian has just released a CD entitled Virtuoso Concertos for Clarino [available through www.bshawmusic. com including works by Michael Haydn, F.X. Richter, and others on period instruments. These works are of a difficulty such that they have been considered unplayable on a Baroque trumpet until very recently. He has also performed with the Boston early Music Festival, Bach Vespers Orchestra, the Clarion Society, and the Grand Tour Orchestra in New York, the Baltimore Handel Society and the Eastman Collegium Musicum.

Shaw holds degrees from Eastern Illinois University (B.Mus), the Eastman School (M.Mus) and the University of Texas at Austin (D.M.A.). While at ESM, he was Principal Trumpet of the Eastman Wind Ensemble during the group's 2004 Far East Tour and the 2005 Carnegie Hall concert. He lives in Baton Rouge with his wife, Paula and their four-legged furry children: Sally, Chloe, and Toby.





As an educator, Dr. Buckles has successfully developed string programs in the New Orleans and Lake Charles areas. As director of the Lake Charles area youth orchestra, he successfully brought the group to the Louisiana Music Educators' Association state large ensemble festival, the first time in the orchestra's history to do so. Since that time, the organization has doubled in size and has been awarded the City of Lake Charles' Mayor's Award for Cultural Group of the Year.

Dr. Buckles serves in a variety of administrative roles which include the past string chair of the Louisiana Music Teachers' Association, the orchestra division chair of the Louisiana Music Educators' Association, as well as president, past president, and treasurer of the American String Teachers' Association of Louisiana.

Paige Rose, assistant professor of music education at the University of Central Arkansas, completed her BME degree from Louisiana State University. As a percussionist, she performed in various collegiate bands





and ensembles, and with Star of Indiana Drum and Bugle Corps. She served as director of bands and instructor of fine arts survey in Louisiana, where she was recognized as the Jeff Davis Parish "Arts Teacher of the Year" in 1997. Dr. Rose completed the Master of Music Education degree from McNeese State University in Lake Charles, Louisiana, and received her doctorate in music education from LSU. At UCA Dr. Rose teaches elementary methods, secondary instrumental methods, music technology, and various internship and graduate courses. Her research interests

include the effects of music on students with autism and the relationship between music and motor skill development. Dr. Rose's research has appeared in *Update: Applications of Research in Music Education*, and she has authored lesson plans for VH1's Cable in the Classroom. Rvan Fisher, Assistant Professor of Choral Music Education at the University of Central Arkansas (UCA), earned a BME from Lee University, a MM in choral conducting and a PhD in music education from the University of North Texas. Dr. Fisher's previous teaching experience includes elementary music, middle school chorus, and high school chorus in Texas where he received numerous teaching awards. In Fall 2008, he began his appointment at UCA where he supervises student teachers, teaches secondary choral methods, coordinates the music education graduate program and summer Orff workshop, and directs the University Chorus. Dr. Fisher is in his second year as the director of the award-winning Central Arkansas Children's Choir. Under his direction, CACC has performed with the Arkansas Symphony Orchestra and Conway Symphony Orchestra, and recently performed at the Arkansas Music Educators Association fall conference. Jeffrey J. Lemke is Professor of Wind Studies, Conducting and Coordinator of Instrumental Music Education Studies at McNeese State University. Dr. Lemke teaches conducting and instrumental methods and literature, advanced instrumental techniques, historical and philosophical foundations of music education,



music supervision and administration. He also supervises instrumental music student teachers and serves on the graduate faculty committee. Dr. Lemke maintains an active schedule as guest conductor, clinician, adjudicator, and consultant for concert, marching and jazz bands throughout the United States and Canada.

Previously he has served as National Coordinator for State Chairs for the College Band Directors National Association, University and Research Division Chair for the Louisiana Music Educators Association, as well as serving as President of the Louisiana Chapter of Phi Beta Mu. In addition to having been appointed as International Student Membership Chairperson for the International Association of Jazz Educators, he is the former Chair of the International Membership Committee and Past President of the Missouri State Unit. He is co-author of the book, *French Music for Low Brass Instruments: An Annotated Bibliography* published by Indiana University Press, which has received critical acclaim as "probably the most valuable and complete piece of scholarship ever produced about low brass instruments." Dr. Lemke is a recent recipient of the prestigious national Orpheus Award presented by the Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia National Music Fraternity for "significant and lasting contributions to music in America."

Prior to his appointment at McNeese State University, Dr. Lemke was Associate Director of Bands at the University of Missouri and guided highly successful instrumental music programs at both the high school and junior high school levels in the public schools of Wisconsin and

Arizona. Dr. Lemke completed his undergraduate work at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, and earned his Master's and Doctoral degrees from the University of Arizona.

Marcia Neel Consultant Band Division Clinic

Marcia Neel will present a clinic titled "Recruiting and Retention: Tools that Work" on Monday, November 22, 2010 from 11:00 a.m. – 12:00 noon.

A veteran of 36 years in public school music education, Marcia Neel has directed successful secondary music programs in Connecticut, Ohio, Massachusetts, and Nevada. She



served as the Supervisor of the Secondary Music Education Program of the Clark County School District (CCSD), headquartered in Las Vegas, Nevada, from 1994 through 2007. During the course of those years, she led the Secondary Music Education Program to a total class count of over 50,000 in 56 middle and 38 high school music programs and over 100,000 in Secondary Fine and Performing Arts overall taking great pride in knowing that all of the students in each of the district's secondary schools are provided with an equal opportunity to study music. In conjunction with the National Association of School Boards, VH1 and NAMM awarded the National Distinguished Service to Music Education Award to the CCSD Board of School Trustees in 2007. The district employs over 500 elementary and secondary music educators.

Well-known for her commitment to program expansion and innovation, Marcia is recognized for her creative approaches to curriculum design and implementation. One of the most popular is the district's standards-based Mariachi Program which was instituted in 2002 and is now staffed by 17 full-time, licensed Mariachi educators. Marcia is the lead author of *¡Simplemente Mariachi!*, an instrumental and vocal method series for mariachi students and educators. She has also authored and edited a number of articles and publications for MENC, the National Association for Music Education and the Music Advisory Council.

Marcia is an ardent Music Education advocate at the local, state, and national levels. She serves on the Supportmusic.com Steering Committee, the MENC National Advocacy Committee, and as a member of the Quincy Jones Musiq Consortium. In addition, she and her husband serve as Music Ambassadors to The Ohio State University School of Music.

Elected to numerous leadership positions, Marcia has served as Western Division President of MENC; President of the Nevada Music Educators Association (two separate terms); and President of the Nevada Choral Directors Association. She was appointed by two Nevada governors to sit on the Goals 2000 Panel and in that capacity, co-chaired the team responsible for the writing of Nevada's Content Standards in Arts Education. In 1993, The Disney Channel selected Marcia as their National Performing Arts Teacher of the Year.

James Boldin is Assistant Professor of Horn at the University of Louisiana at Monroe, where he teaches applied horn







The McNeese State University Chamber Singers will present a guest performance under the direction of Dr. Darryl Jones on Friday, November 19, 2010 from 1:00-2:00 p.m.

Dr. Darryl Jones, Assistant Professor of Music and Director of Choral Activities, is currently in his eleventh year at McNeese State University where he conducts the Concert Chorale, Chamber Singers, Vocal Ensemble and teaches Choral Conducting, Choral Literature, Elementary and Secondary Methods and Materials. Dr. Jones is the program coordinator for the BMED K-12 vocal music education area and is the university supervisor for student teachers in the vocal area. Dr. Jones serves as the artistic director of the Louisiana Choral Foundation, and is the Chancel Choir director at University United Methodist Church.

Dr. Jones earned the B.S.E.D. and M.M.E. degrees from Western Carolina University and the Ph.D. degree in Music Education from Florida State University. Dr. Jones served as chairman of the music department and choral director at Lindsey Wilson College in Columbia, Kentucky and was choral director at Leon High School in Tallahassee, Florida for twelve years. Dr. Jones frequently teaches master classes, serves as clinician for honor choirs and serves as adjudicator for choral festivals and events. He is an active member in American Choral Director's Association, Music Educators National Conference, National Association of Teachers of Singing, and Louisiana Music Educators Association.

Chamber Singers is the premier vocal ensemble at McNeese State University. It is comprised of primarily music majors, but also includes many talented non-music majors. Chamber Singers is an auditioned group that performs a variety of traditional and non-traditional choral literature ranging from unaccompanied motets and major choral masterworks to spirituals, folk-songs and world music.

Chamber Singers has performed in many different venues. The group has joined forces with the Lake Charles Symphony and the Louisiana Choral Foundation to present Robert Kapilow's commissioned work for the bicentennial celebration of the Louisiana Purchase 03: This New Immense, Unbounded World and Carl Orff's Carmina Burana. Recently, the group teamed with the Voices of London and the McNeese Wind Symphony to deliver a performance of Keith Gates' An American Requiem, which was broadcast on Louisiana Public Television. Most recently, Chamber Singers collaborated with jazz artist, Kelley Hunt, the McNeese Steel Band, and Glenn McClure for a performance of Mr. McClure's St. Francis in the Americas: A Caribbean Mass.



Jay N. Jacobs has served as a conductor and music educator in public schools and universities for over 15 years. Born in Morgantown, West Virginia, Dr. Jacobs earned his bachelor of music degree from West Virginia University. He taught for eight years in Kirkland, Illinois, leading the instrumental music program at Hiawatha Middle School and High School to triple in student participation. Following his time in



Illinois, Jacobs began his graduate studies at the University of Florida, where he earned his master of music degree in wind conducting and his doctor of philosophy degree in music education. While at the University of Florida, he conducted all levels of concert ensembles, taught music education courses, worked with undergraduate conductors, and was awarded as the College of Fine Arts Outstanding Graduate Student in 2007

Dr. Jacobs has served as a clinician and adjudicator in West Virginia, Illinois, Georgia, Florida, Louisiana and Texas, and as a presenter at several professional conferences. He has performed in or conducted ensembles in England, Scotland, and Singapore. He is presently Assistant Professor of Music and Conductor of University Bands at McNeese State University in Lake Charles, Louisiana, where he teaches conducting, and directs the wind symphony, symphonic band, and all athletic bands. His professional affiliations include the College Band Directors National Association, College Music Society, Louisiana Music Educators Association, National Band Association and the Music Educators National Conference.

The Wind Symphony is the premiere performance organization of the McNeese State University Band Program. The ensemble fosters the highest performance standards while offering its members an opportunity to expand their technical, intellectual, and musical horizons. The McNeese State University Jazz Ensemble, under the direction of Rick Condit will present a guest performance on Saturday, November 20, 2010, from 12:00 noon – 12:45 p.m.

Rick Condit has been an active saxophonist and jazz educator for more than 30 years. He has taught and performed in 26 countries on 5 continents. In 2002, he spent six months as a Fulbright Senior Scholar at the "George Enescu University of the Arts" in Romania while on leave from his post as Director of Jazz Studies and Associate Professor of Saxophone at McNeese State University in Lake Charles, La. Since then he has returned to Romania 6 times for concerts, clinics and other Fulbright related projects.

Originally from the San Francisco Bay Area, Condit spent more than 10 years there as a freelance professional, performing with such noted artists as Ella Fitzgerald, Louie Bellson, Ray Brown, Oliver Nelson, Bob Hope, and the San Francisco Symphony Pops Orchestra. During this period he also toured for over a year as tenor sax soloist with the Stan Kenton Orchestra, presenting concerts and clinics in 46 states, Canada, and Japan.

Condit received his Master of Music degree in jazz studies from the University of North Texas, where he was a graduate teaching fellow and member of the One O'Clock Lab Band. His own group, the Louisiana Jazz 5, has toured France and Central America and performed at the IAJE Conference. Condit and guitarist Tom Wolfe toured 5 countries in West Africa as Kennedy Center Jazz Ambassadors, and he has been the recipient of a Louisiana Artist's Fellowship.

Under Condit's direction, the McNeese Jazz Ensemble has performed at

the Montreux Jazz Festival (Switzerland), Festival Internationale (Nice, France), the IAJE Conference, and twice in residency at Disney World. Recent guest artists have included Bobby Sanabria and Quartetto Ache, The Yosvanny Terry Quartet, The Rosanna Eckert Quartet, the Arturo O'Farrill Quintet, Nneena Freelon, and The Marcus Roberts Trio.
