

Representing The United States Army Band "Pershing's Own," The U.S. Army Blues Swamp Romp has been active for almost two decades, performing traditional jazz and folk music of Louisiana in support of recruiting and community outreach initiatives throughout our nation. Past performances include national broadcasts on ESPN, Emeril Live, and WWOZ's renowned New Orleans Music Show. In addition, the Swamp Romp has supported vital volunteer efforts, including America's Gulf Coast rebuilding operations implemented after Hurricane Katrina's devastating impact.

As with each group within The U.S. Army Band, members of Swamp Romp are deeply committed to education as part of its mission. The Swamp Romp regularly presents concerts and clinics in public schools and at major



universities, promoting the proven cross benefits between childhood music participation and science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM).

Through the years, there has only been one constant: no two Swamp Romp performances have EVER been the same. Improvisation, audience interaction, humor, joy, and audacity all combine to create a musical gumbo unique to each occasion. In performances, all musicians, even those without jazz experience, are enthusiastically encouraged to collaborate with colleagues through impromptu jam sessions, looking away from the printed page whenever possible. Magic happens when friends join together for bold, unplanned musical journeys. This live recording captures the spontaneity, camaraderie, and jubilance of this unique ensemble's onstage performances.

6:00 pm THE US NAVY BAND SEA CHANTERS

The Navy Band Sea Chanters is the United States Navy's official chorus. The ensemble performs a variety of music, from traditional choral music, including sea chanteys and patriotic fare, to opera, Broadway, and contemporary music.

The Sea Chanters chorus is frequently found at the center of our most important national events. They have played a vital role in comforting the nation in times of mourning, including appearances at memorials for the astronauts of the space shuttle Columbia and the presidential wreath laying ceremonies at the United Airlines flight 93 crash site in Shanksville, Pennsylvania. The chorus

participated in the funerals for former Presidents Ronald Reagan, Gerald Ford and Richard Nixon.

They have appeared at the Kennedy Center Honors and with the National Symphony Orchestra for the nationally telecast "National Memorial Day Concerts" at the U.S. Capitol. In addition, the group has appeared on "Larry King Live" and "CBS This Morning," as well as that the premier of the movie "Pearl Harbor."

Throughout their history, the Sea Chanters have remained true to the Navy's watchwords of pride and professionalism, and they continue to flourish as a vibrant ensemble.

6:00 pm THE US ARMY BLUES

The U.S. Army Blues, part of the United States Army Band "Pershing's Own," is the premier jazz ensemble of the United States Army. After informal beginnings in 1970, this 18-piece ensemble became an official element of the Army Band in 1972. Comprised of exceptional jazz musicians from across the nation, the Army Blues strive to fulfill their mission through public concerts, educational outreach, and the preservation of the tradition of America's unique art form: jazz.

The Army Blues have performed at prestigious venues such as the Monterey Jazz Festival, the Montreux Jazz Festival, the famous Birdland jazz club in New York City, and the legendary jazz club Blues Alley club in Washington,



DC. The Army Blues give frequent performances at national conferences such as the Jazz Education Network annual conference, the International Trumpet Guild conference, the International Trombone Conference, and the Music Educators National Conference.

To celebrate their thirty-fifth anniversary, the Army Blues recorded a double CD album entitled Blues at Thirty-Five in 2007. This album won two Washington Area Music Awards ("Wammies") in the categories of Best Big Band Group and Best Big Band Recording. Since that time, the ensemble has recorded <u>Live at Blues Alley</u> an educational initiative release called <u>Blues Plus You</u> and most recently, a collaborative effort with the Library of Congress titled Jazz from the Stacks.

The Marine Band performs a varied repertoire including new works for wind ensemble, traditional concert band literature, challenging orchestral transcriptions, and the patriotic marches that made it famous. The U.S. Marine Band is the only musical unit that bears the title "The President's Own" and whose mission is to provide music for the President of the United States and the Commandant of the Marine Corps.

The Marine Band performs at the White House for:


- Events of national importance such as State Arrivals* and national days of remembrance
- Holiday events such as the National Christmas Tree Lighting, Easter Egg Roll, and Independence Day
- White House activities such as celebrations, receptions, and ceremonies
- * A State Arrival is an official ceremony during which the President formally welcomes visiting Heads of State. A 49-piece Marine Band is used, on a rotating basis with the military bands in Washington, D.C., for State Arrivals.

Ceremonies the Marine Band performs for: The Presidential Inauguration, State Funerals, Full Honors Funerals at Arlington National Cemetery, Marine Barracks Washington, Friday Evening Parades and Patriotic Opener.

Pastiche creations of choral theatre are not simply a mish-mash of unrelated repertoire with superimposed staging elements; rather, through thoughtful storyboarding (including the commissioning of new compositions), the whole of the resulting performance is, indeed, much greater than the sum of its separate parts. Artists, audiences, and communities alike are transformed in unexpected, profound ways as they engage with myriad thematic possibilities, including issues of social justice and cultural relevance, in this unique concert-length format appropriate to all experience levels.

FFeaturing new insights and perspectives from two leading figures in the fields of choral music and opera, this session will showcase notable examples of opera-choral fusion, will detail the process of creating a pastiche production, and will highlight the careful fostering of safe space environments that are most

necessary to both unlock genuine humanity and authenticity in performers and allow audiences to encounter and contend with difficult subjects. A chamber ensemble of undergraduate and graduate students will attend the conference with the presenters and will demonstrate a brief example of a choral work composed for a larger project that examined aspects of lonesomeness and isolation. Participation in choral music in the United States of America is a vital part of social life in a variety of settings: professional, amateur, and educational. As such, choir should be an inclusive and safe space that is welcoming to all. This clinic session contributes to the growing national conversation around broadening choral music's inclusivity and offers ideas to assist with the ongoing process of building, enhancing, and maintaining inclusive choral spaces. There are many elements that have an impact on safe rehearsal and performance spaces including accessibility, atmosphere, attire, financial obligations, language, repertoire choice, types of ensembles offered, and, especially in light of a global pandemic, access to technology. Nevertheless, the most important thing we can do is recognize that there are barriers and have a conversation about ways to create spaces that invite all axes of identities into choir. Though we will never be able to predict all the needs of every participant, vocal musicians will recognize efforts to include everyone. This process takes time, and mistakes (with good intentions) will be made, however, consciously thinking about how to create safe spaces is the first step towards building inclusive choirs.

Why Won't They Perform the Christmas Music?

Christmas music continues to be among many music teachers' winter repertoire selections. Yet, students and families from diverse religious and cultural groups often raise objections to such repertoire. Implementing Trauma-Sensitive Practices in Music Education

Experts estimate that 66% of children under the age of 16 have experienced at least one traumatic event. The extreme stress of these events has a profound effect on children and their needs in the classroom. Given the number of students music teachers typically serve and the high rates of adverse childhood experiences, music teachers can be certain that they will teach at least one student who has experienced trauma. Research shows that people who have experienced trauma see improved outcomes when they are treated with a trauma-sensitive approach. Through a trauma-sensitive approach, it may even be possible to help your students break the cycle of trauma.

This session will help participants understand the needs of students who have experienced trauma and the behaviors these students may exhibit. Participants will learn specific strategies to help these students and improve overall classroom culture, including nonviolent/compassionate communication, deliberate relationship building, and routine development. Attendees will leave this clinic empowered and prepared to create a trauma-sensitive learning environment in their music classes and rehearsals.
